St. JAMES MEN'S CLUB

The Men's Club at St. James is a busy group of approximately twenty of the men in the congregation who are dedicated to the success of many of the events in the church. Allan Farrell, who presently serves as Chair of the Church Council, has served as President of the Club since 1995. He is supported by a hard working executive, which includes Bob Day as secretary and Bob Murray as treasurer.

Attendance at their monthly dinner meetings averages ten to twelve members. Friendship and fellowship are key ingredients of these meetings and a number of the members have belonged for most of the years since the Club began in the mid-1950's. The members were saddened by the deaths of several long-standing members this past year, Ray Reeves, Stubbert McHattie, Angus MacMillan and Bill Reddick. Their valuable contributions over the years will be remembered with respect and many happy memories.

The Club's biggest event, and certainly the most visible in the community, is the annual Lobster Supper, a fixture in Antigonish since the first supper was held in November of 1979. The following year the event was changed to March and has continued as a spring event ever since. At first, it was a supper starting in the late afternoon but had to be changed to the noon hour one year due to an impending snowstorm. The timeframe worked well and has remained at that time ever since. As we know times and prices have changed over the past thirty years. It is interesting to note that the first meal had a price tag of \$5.50.


More than six hundred meals of lobster, salads, rolls and desserts are prepared and distributed each year. This undertaking, although spearheaded by the Men's Club, would not be executed without the help of many others in the congregation. The women of the UCW are certainly key contributors to the event as are many others at St. James who contribute time and talent in order to carry out the tremendous effort that goes into this annual event. The kitchen and hall at St. James buzzes with activity for several days in order to turn a seemingly endless supply of lobster, potatoes and other vegetables, hundred of rolls and a variety of desserts into a veritable feast. This year the event will be held on Friday, March 30th.

The financial success of this tremendous effort makes it possible for the Men's Club to make a number of generous donations to the church and community. They give an annual scholarship to a graduating student at the local high school, donate to the Benevolent Fund at St. James and this year were able to contribute hand bells for our newest musical group. In addition, this past year they gave \$3,000.00 to the General Fund at St. James.

They add to the Easter Sunday celebrations by cooking a delicious pancake breakfast for the congregation following the Sunrise Service and do their part in the success of the Stump Frolic (now called the St. James Fun Day) by cooking hot dogs for the crowd.

They recognize the contribution of the women in their lives (who provide most of the dinners for the monthly meetings) by holding an annual Ladies Night – a lobster supper.

All men in the congregation are welcome to join their group. If you are interested, please speak to Allan Farrell, president of the club or any member.

As many of you know, St. James UCW was in a bit of a turmoil at the beginning of this year wondering whether it was worthwhile to continue as a functioning group. As our members age, it is becoming more difficult to find women who will take leadership in various ways, as well as workers for our many fundraising projects. New members are desperately needed to inject new life into the group. Some of the members completed surveys and many long discussions were held within the group. To quote one member, "When one of us hurts, we all hurt." We cry together, cook together and laugh together. We learn about each other's families, hear about children and grandchildren, weddings and deaths, differences in fashion are debated over tea, support is there when one is low and celebrations when one is high. Would that same feeling be there if we did not have this interaction with one another?" We hold program meetings that open our minds to people, places and organizations that otherwise we might not know about. In the end, it was unanimously decided that we do want to continue.

This year is the 50th anniversary of the United Church Women in Canada. We plan to celebrate this event with various activities throughout the year, both with the congregation and within our group. As well, one of our members will be attending the National UCW Celebration in Ancaster, Ontario in July. Next month we are planning a silent bake sale with the proceeds going to the Mission and Service Fund in memory of three of our past members who were so active in the UCW Ida Mason, Doris Archibald and Emily Sweet. On April 14, we will hold our annual spring yard sale. Later in the spring, we are planning a Queen's Silver Jubilee tea. In closing, if you would like to join our group or would just like more information about the UCW, please speak to Betty Webber or Barb Gardiner, co-chairs, or any member. We have an evening unit and two afternoon units that meet on the second Tuesday or Wednesday of the month. You would be most welcome in any of the groups.


THE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN **Revised Plan**

Dale Archibald answered questions concerning the final draft of the blueprints and Brian MacLeod informed the meeting that the next step will be the hiring of RBR consultants to train volunteers and supervise the fund raising campaign.

A meeting is scheduled for early April to have the congregation give final approval to contracting with consultants. Representatives from RBR Consultants will be in attendance.

From the Archives Members Chastised by the Session for Intoxication

From the Minutes of the Session of St. James Presbyterian Church, September 29, 1876.

In the Manse at Antigonish September 29, 1876, the Session met and was constituted. Sederant the Moderator of Session (Rev. P Goodfellow) Messers John MacDonald, Nathan Pushie, Dr. Chisholm and John MacMillan, Elders. After devotional exercises the minutes of the two previous meetings were read and sustained.

Charles Cunningham appeared to answer to a charge of intoxication made against him. He acknowledged the correctness of the charge, expressed his sorrow and resolved an amendment through God's grace helping him. After suitable admonishing from the Moderator and elders he was dismissed. Mr. MacDonald reported that he had called on A. M. Cunningham Esq. about a report of his being intoxicated. He denied that he was drunk but admitted that he drank some. The Session not having full proof of to substantiate the rumours, dismissed the case. Mr. MacDonald also reported that he had called on Mr. & Mrs. Alec Cameron and was unable to see them. The meeting closed with prayer.

As evidenced in the photos they were happy to accept this invitation and were very interested in the project, joining in with the fellowship and making a contribution by taking up some knitting needles.

Beryl Publicover, Nomsa Ingwe from Zambia and Maryhame Hanna from Egypt enjoyed dinner at the Main St. Café where they had a chance to chat with Andrew Murray and compliment him on the changes he has made to the restaurant.

After completing the first six weeks of their course (in the midst of our Antigonish winter), they have been placed in work projects in various countries other than their own. They will spend nine weeks in their placements where they will share their knowledge working with a variety of different organizations. Maryhame will spend her time in Nomsa's home of Zambia while Nomsa will work with an NGO (our version of a charitable organization) in Botswana. Faith has travelled to Egypt and Tawani to Tanzania.

They will return to Antigonish at the beginning of May for a further three weeks of classes before going home to use their education to empower other women in their communities.

We are hoping that these remarkable young women will be able to join us at St. James for a Sunday service during their stay.





Sunday School News


The Sunday school children are looking forward to participating in the Earth Day service on April 22nd. We have been learning a new song to share with the congregation.
