#### SENIOR FELLOWSHIP GROUP

The Senior Fellowship group at St. James was formed on September 18, 2008 with 18 inaugural members. At that time it was agreed that we would meet in the parlour from 2:00 pm to 4:00 pm on the third Wednesday of each month except for July and August and the programs would be designed for people 55 years of age or older. It was agreed that \$1.00 would be collected from each member in attendance at a meeting. These funds have accumulated over the past four years and we have been able to make contributions to the VON, Sleeping Children Around the World, and L'Arche Summer Program.

Our programs have included presentations by various members of the congregation about their trips and the group's memories of their childhood and work experiences. We have also invited speakers from community groups relating to health and care around the home.

Over the past four years we have journeyed to the Redden Gardens and the Museum at Cape George, the Sugar Moon Farm and taken a tour of Antigonish Landing with Bart Wainwright. Our most recent visit has been to the new L'Arche homes on Hawthorne St. The group has gone bowling on three occasions and have had several afternoons of cribbage and scrabble. We have enjoyed a meal of Chinese food at the Moonlight Restaurant as well as pot luck lunches in June

and/or September. Our gathering concludes with afternoon tea with sweets provided by members of the group on a rotating basis.

Our average attendance is 15 but we would welcome all members of the congregation in this age group to come and join us in our enjoyment of fun, food and fellowship along with some interesting presentations and the occasional trip.



But we did not rest on our laurels throughout the summer, a number of ideas were percolating! Here are just some of the initiatives we are currently working on:

- organizing monthly pot lucks targeting
   Antigonish's international community –
   students and workers
- on behalf of the whole congregation, organizing an *Adopt-A-Highway* project to start at the end of October
- sponsoring two films in the *Antigonish International Film Festival*19/20 October
- organizing the *Antigonish Gift Book* with an eye to promotion prior to Christmas
- writing letters in support of various worthwhile initiatives (such as the *Disabled Network in Antigonish*) or critical of government policies not in sync with United Church policies (generally dealing with poverty issues of housing, transportation, food security, etc.)
- participating in other local social justice projects and organizations such as the *International Day for the Eradication of Poverty, World Food Day*, the *Antigonish Emergency Fuel Fund* and the *Antigonish Poverty Reduction Coalition*

Jim led us in opening worship and briefly outlined the plan for the day. The theme was Boxes, Baskets and Backpacks. It was a very different way to get us thinking and exchanging ideas. There were six tables with five at each table.

#### Session 1 - Boxes (The Past)

We were each given a box and told to reflect on what we should let go of and pack away and what we would like to take from the past and renew in our lives. We discussed our lists at the table and shared with other tables with Jim's help. The list of things we want to "let go" out of our lives we were to put in the box and Jim packed them all in a big box and threw it out. - those things are gone now!

UCW Conference in Ancaster, Ontario Michelle spoke to us on her experiences at the Conference. There were over 500 women there from all across Canada. The theme was "Tapestry" like our groups when cloth is woven some places are very strong, some are frayed, Some are weak, etc. It was very informative and thought provoking.

We kept these lists and put them in our bag along with the past list that we wanted to revive and the present list that we wanted to keep and/or improve on. ## FROM THE ARCHIVES

#### Reminders needed in the 1870's and Home Baptisms

At the Manse on the 9th day of January AD1880 the Session met and was constituted with prayer by the Moderator (the Minister). Present the Moderator, Msrs. D. Chisholm, Samuel Williams, H.H. McCurdy and R. Dickson, Elders. The minutes of last meeting were read and sustained.

At a previous meeting of Session H.H. McCurdy and R, Dickson had been appointed to see Mr. Burnside and to converse with him together, asking him to read a sermon at Sabbath morning exercises during the absence of the Minister at Cape George, these brethren having neglected this matter were at this meeting reappointed to wait upon Mr. Burnside on the same subject.

The Moderator brought to the notice of the Session that it was the desire of Mrs. David Graham to have her two children baptized next Sabbath at 3 pm at the house of Mr. W. Randall, the request of Mrs. Graham was granted in as much she was unable through a long illness to leave the house. After two of the brethren had engaged in prayer the meeting was closed by the Moderator pronouncing the Benediction.

#### The Follow Up

At a meeting of the Session on the 27th day of February AD 1870, it is recorded that Mr. R. Dickson one of the Committee appointed to see Mr. Burnside respecting the reading of a sermon on Sabbath morning in the absence of the Minister, reported that he saw Mr. Burnside and he gave him to understand that he would take his turn in due course.
