Lenten Pilgrimage for Ceasefire in Gaza and Israel

On March 2, 20 enthusiastic walkers gathered at the mall to prepare for the first of two 18-kilometre walks in support of a Gaza-Israel ceasefire. Organized by Rev. Tasha Brubaker, Sara Avmaat, and Linda Darwish, the Antigonish group was just one of 145 Lenten Pilgrimages taking place around the world under the auspices of Gaza Ceasefire Pilgrimage (https://www.gazaceasefirepilgrimage.com/). In addition to raising awareness, the pilgrimage also aimed to raise money for three Gaza-related causes (more about this below). One week later, a slightly smaller but no less enthusiastic group gathered to begin the second 18-kilometre route. For that one, we recruited the leadership of veteran pilgrimage leader, Dr. Matthew Anderson, Chair of Christian Studies at StFX.

After an introduction to the origins and purpose of the global initiative, we began the first of four 9-kilometre routes, up Church Street, where we stopped outside of St. James, where Linda led us in a brief time of reflection and prayer for Gaza. We then headed westward along Main street to Hawthorne, up Hawthorne to Whidden Street, stopping for a well-deserved break at Hawthorne Convenience before heading back down Hawthorne to West Street, from which we turned right on Highland Drive to walk as far as the Junior School where we took another water break. The route then took Greening Drive to join up with James Street. A left on James took us to the intersection of the university, where we turned right to catch the new walking/bicycle path along Hwy 4. Before you knew it, we were back to square one, only to start the complete route one more time. On each 9-kilometre leg, we were accompanied at various points by a two-person car, complete with extra water and a First Aid kit just in case. All done, we had walked 18 kilometres, or approximately 25,000 steps, in one day.

Completed twice, the 36 kilometres matched the distance between Gaza City and Rafah, a walk that over a million Gazans – young, old, able-bodied, sick and injured – have done on foot, car, and donkey cart, over rubble-filled roads, carrying everything they now owned, with little potable water, and under the constant threat of Israeli bombardment. Not merely a threat, being shot and killed along the way, or being stopped at Israeli checkpoints where men have been arrested in scores and families separated is a real occurrence. And, at the other end, there was no car to take them back to their comfortable homes for an evening of rest and relaxation. Instead, safe arrival in Rafah meant it was time to start setting up a large tent to accommodate the whole family, and to start looking for some type of fuel to cook whatever food they might have purchased at exorbitant prices in Rafah or had managed to obtain in aid.

Though our pilgrimage was envisioned as a quiet and prayerful walk, it was hard not to take up the opportunity for conversation, catching up with colleagues and friends from StFX and the community, or getting to know people we had met just that day. It's amazing how quickly 18-kilometres on foot can pass when one is engaged in good conversation (and doesn't have to worry about snipers and bomber jets).

There was a different prayer service each Saturday. On March 2, Linda patched together a few poignant thoughts from Rev. Munther Isaac, Lutheran priest of Bethlehem Christmas Church, along with several prayers from Sabeel, Ecumenical Liberation Theology Centre, Palestine, based in Jerusalem. On March 9, Linda played two videos: the Lord's Prayer in Arabic (also played on March 2); and a beautiful prayer composed by Palestinian Christians of Christ at the Checkpoint, based in Bethlehem.



What is YOUTH@REGION? Y@R is a place of community and a place of faith where United Church youth, between grade 6 and grade 12, meet from across Nova Scotia and Bermuda. It takes place during the Annual Meeting of Bermuda-Nova Scotia Regional Council (BNS), which is a gathering of representatives who make decisions and set policies for the United Church of Canada. The group creates an inclusive, diverse and safe community for youth in the name of Christ. Who decides when Easter will be each year?

Unlike Christmas which is always the same day on the calendar, Easter moves from year to year. That's because the early church tried to keep it close to the time described in the gospels as being near the Jewish festival of the Passover. The exact method of deciding the date of Easter is quite complicated but basically it usually works out that Easter falls on the Sunday after the first full moon in spring -and when the first full moon is a Sunday it's the next Sunday. That means that Easter can come as early as March 22 and as late as April 25. Normally though, our celebration of the resurrection of Jesus falls on the first week of April. This year though we are a bit earlier as the full moon after the start of spring (March 20) which is actually March 25 this year which is why Easter falls on March 31st.
